

Christ Church Vicarage

Dear Friends.

Many years ago I was greatly helped by words from the commentator Rhidian Brooke on Radio 4's 'Thought for the Day' as he had returned from investigating HIV Aids across Africa on behalf of the Salvation Army.

'The world is in a very, very bad state but is being held together by countless acts of loving human kindness.'

It is absolutely heartbreaking seeing the effects of the Russian invasion in the Ukraine with so many people, towns, cities and villages being affected.

Thank you for your prayers, thoughts and compassionate acts which, added together, make such an enormous difference to our fellow human beings in their hour of need.

Where is God in the midst of human suffering and pain? This is the question we will return to ever more honestly, openly and compassionately this coming, never to be repeated, Holy Week and Easter 2022. We are all facing challenges and we need to be reminded that the joy of the Lord is our strength. (Nehemiah 8, v.10.)

I have been enormously helped by a film which was aired for the first time on BBC4 on Wednesday 23rd February, the night before the war began.

I have shared it with colleagues and friends across Swindon and it has been enormously well received. The film shares the distilled wisdom from two spiritual leaders about how they have found joy to be God's gift, infectious and long-lasting in the midst of the tremendous suffering they have faced during their lives. It is my prayer that we will receive afresh God's comforting joy in Jesus Christ this Easter, remembering that 'We are Easter people and Alleluia is our song'.

I found these words below outside Monmouth Priory Church the morning after watching the film. I was struck immediately by their poignancy, coming from an anonymous Irish poet remembering the vision of the Corrymeela Community, 'It is better to light a candle than to curse the darkness'.

Take Time

Take time to think: it is the source of power.

Take time to read; it is the foundation of wisdom.

Take time to play; it is the secret of staying young.

Take time to be quiet; it is the opportunity to see God.

Take time to be aware; it is the opportunity to help others.

Take time to love and be loved; it is God's greatest gift.

Take time to laugh; it is the music of the soul.

Take time to be friendly; it is the road to happiness.

Take time to dream; it is what the future is made of.

Take time to pray; It is the greatest power on earth.

As we continue to pray for peace in the world, beginning in our own hearts and lives, it will be a privilege to have the Ukrainian flag flying outside Christ Church, reminding us of God's presence in Jesus Christ with all our sisters and brothers who are suffering there and in other situations of conflict across the world. Never has Jesus' ecumenical passion, shared by Archbishop Desmond Tutu and the Dalai Lama, been so important and necessary. I am proud to share with you in being part of the oldest Ecumenical Partnership of Churches in the country. I am very conscious of those who have gone before us and those who will come after us.


Christ has died.

CHRISTIAN AID WEEK 2022 - MAY 15th to 21st

The theme for this year's Christian Aid Week is "Hungry to provide". It focuses on three women from Zimbabwe who have been affected by drought due to climate change. Janice is struggling to provide for her family whereas Janet has already been provided with help to grow drought resistant crops and is now thriving. The third, Jerina, has diversified and trained to become a welder along with her husband.

Last year's Christian Aid Week raised $\pounds 5.7m$ despite all the restrictions and difficulties in place at the time. The Old Town Partnership's contribution to this amazing total was $\pounds 2,870$. Christian Aid have a set a target for this year of $\pounds 7m$ and we would like to do our bit to help meet this target.

There are a number of ways that you can help us do this:

- Whilst we do not think that the traditional house-to-house collection is appropriate now, there is an alternative delivery only envelopes, which are delivered with details of where to return them. Specific envelopes are available for this purpose. Feedback from other places shows that, while you may not get many envelopes back, those that are returned have more in them (and are more likely to have the Gift Aid completed). This means that the overall total collected is very similar. If you would be prepared to deliver these envelopes in your own road, or nearby roads, and have them returned to your home then please let us know.
- As for the last two years there will be e-envelopes which you set up on-line and send to family, friends and colleagues. These have been improved for this year.
- You could hold a coffee morning or afternoon tea at your home or in your garden.
- You could take part in the 300,000 steps challenge for the month of May. This was introduced last year and was very successful.
- You could organise or take part in some other sort of sponsored event or activity (the more imaginative the better!).
- You could hold one of Christian Aid's Big Brekkies for which they have an information pack.
- You could hold a sale of items such as books or jigsaws.

These are just a few suggestions and ideas that we hope will stimulate you to get involved. We do hope that you will want to play your part. If you would like to take up any of these suggestions, or have any others of your own, then do please let us know and we can provide you with appropriate information and advice. In particular, do please let us know if you would like to use the delivery only envelopes.

INTERNATIONALLY RENOWNED ART COLLECTION COMES TO BEWDLEY

A selection of art from the internationally renowned Methodist Modern Art Collection, one of the UK's most significant collections of modern religious art, will be on display in the Wyre Forest Gallery at Bewdley Museum each day from Saturday 26 March until Sunday 24 April 2022. Opening hours are 11.00am to 3.00pm and admission is free.

The total Collection features fifty works, including some by well-known artists such as Graham Sutherland, Elisabeth Frink, William Roberts and Maggi Hambling. Some of the artists were or are Christian, while others are not, but together they offer widely differing perspectives on the Christian story. An extensive conservation programme has recently been completed to return these important paintings to their full glory and to ensure they are available for future generations.

Twenty works have been chosen for the Bewdley exhibition, depicting scenes from different stages of the life of Jesus before focussing on his crucifixion and resurrection.

A programme of exciting creative events, including workshops, talks and reflections has also been planned over the duration of the exhibition. Full details can be found at: www.forallpeoplebewdley.com

This exhibition has been organised by the ecumenical group, Bewdley Churches Together, consisting of six local churches, and is financially supported by several local organisations.

Christ Church with St. Mary's

Charles Vince, celebrating 60 years as a chorister

My parents Len (1924-2013) and Doreen (1927-2002) were married at Christ Church on the 13th October 1951. My Christian journey and what was to be my very long association with Christ Church began in 1954.

I first entered Christ Church choir in April 1962 following an invitation from choirmaster Gordon Crabbe. I began a period of three months' probation which was successful. At the end of this trial I was presented by Gordon to the vicar Canon Frank Thomas to be admitted a full member of the choir. I sung in the soprano section of the choir until my voice broke in 1967. I was confirmed, with several other boy sopranos, in 1966 by Bishop Oliver Tomkins.

It was in 1963 that I began taking lessons on the piano. The second school I attended held one or two services at the old St. Mary's church building in The Mall. The priest in charge of St Mary's at the time was the Rev'd. John Stephens. I had not received any formal training on the organ at that time. It was not until much later, in about 1985, that I began to receive formal training on the organ.

In 1972, I returned to sing in the adult section of the choir, but in 1982 I decided that I would like to branch out on my own as an organist as I was receiving a lot of requests to play for services in other churches.

It was from 1982 to 1985 that I was organist of St.Leonard's Church in Blunsdon. In 1985 I went to All Saints at Lydiard and in 1990 returned to Blunsdon church. It was while I was at Blunsdon that I accompanied the choir singing the sacred works Olivet to Calvary, Stainer's Crucifixion and Lloyd Webber's, The Saviour.

In the year 2000 I decided to take a break from organ playing and I sang Tenor for a while for Dr. John Henderson at Wroughton Church. It was during this time that another organist's post became vacant, this time at Cricklade, and I was invited to apply.

In 2009 I was on the move again and my final posting was at Bath Road Methodist Church. In January 2017 I returned once again to Christ Church to sing in the choir. Although I have been organist and director of music in other churches, I have also sung in them when the opportunities have arisen.

During my 60 years as a chorister at Christ Church, two editions of the BBC Songs of Praise programme were recorded. The first was in 1966 and the second in 1976. These were in the more traditional format, very different from the style of the programme today.

It was between about 1985 and 1992 that I undertook some formal training on the organ at Marlborough College Chapel that supported a very fine Hill Norman and Beard four manual organ. My tutor was Christopher Rathbone a former organist of Carlisle Cathedral. During this time, I took some grade examinations on the organ. In previous years I had taken grade examinations on the Piano as well as the Theory of Music.

During my time as a boy chorister, we were invited out to sing carols at various venues around Swindon at Christmas time, including the old British Railway Works canteen. The full choir also joined us at some of the venues at Christmas. Traditionally, until recently, the choir has always sung carols at the main hospital every year.

My earliest recollections at Christ Church are that I attended Sunday School in King William Street School. We always attended a service once a month in Christ Church at 2.30pm on a Sunday afternoon. After leaving the Sunday School, I progressed on to what was then called Junior Church. As time went on, the time of 2.30pm was becoming increasingly unpopular, so Sunday Schools were held on a Sunday morning and, as a result, attendances rose accordingly.

At Christ Church we used to be a training parish, so there was a regular "turnover" of clergy as every three years curates would come and go. Some continued their training elsewhere while others were promoted to higher positions in other parishes.

I have seen many changes in hymn books and service books used over time. Alternative versions of the Prayer Book came about in 1965 and 1966 and a period of experimentation with more modern services began, culminating in the Alternative Service Book in 1980 which, in the course of time, became defunct and was replaced by Common Worship.

There is just one other story that I recall from my time at Christ Church: we sang at a wedding in the 1960s which was led by Rev'd. Ted Farley, a curate at the time. The wedding service was completed in just 20 – 25 minutes! Nothing was missed out and it is a record that has never been surpassed! Here's to the next 60!

DREAMS, PRAYERS AND PLANS

Where to begin is my first thought. Ally and I met each other when we were living in a hostel for the homeless. Ally moved in 1 or 2 months after I did. We became close friends very quickly with our interests in music and art, nature and the outdoors as well as our survival stories. I had been attending Christ Church almost daily, starting Alpha and looking at my life as a Christian.

Ally started coming with me when I went to pray in the Lady Chapel and then started coming with me on Sundays. Afterwards we would talk for hours



about what we had heard in church that day. It always seemed that when we had a question about something in life that we were facing, the answer was always there in what we heard at Christ Church. For the first time in both our lives we felt accepted and loved. After a few months, Ally and i completed the Alpha course and I had my Confirmation. Ally had her Christening and by then we had fallen in love with each other. Neither of us were really looking for a champion. For me, after my marriage breakdown, I was closed off to relationships and I thought that part of my heart had hardened. I am so grateful for God's grace and Jesus Christ transforming a hardened heart into an open heart is my proof that miracles do happen.

Ally and I were working at a restaurant part time as part of rebuilding our lives. I had many years experience running restaurants and Ally soon mastered the key skills in hospitality. So together we looked into running a pub. This would give us employment and a place to live that would just be for us. It is really hard being in a shared house, living with strangers, so it seemed to be a good plan.

We put together our CVs and it wasn't long before we got a call to attend an interview. Our first interview, we were so nervous and excited at the same time. We got right down to planning our train journey to Trimley St Mary, a village near Felixstowe, Suffolk. We met with the owners of the pub, Melissa and Terry. We didn't think we would get the job but we were happy to have had a day out and some practice of being interviewed.

To our suprise, we got a phone call from Melissa the next day offering us the position as Management couple at The Mariners. WOW!!! we had got it. We walked to Christ Church where we prayed and gave thanks to God for His grace and blessing. This is it, our big opportunity, so we celebrated our news with our friends and family.

Moving day, van rented and belongings packed ready for transport. Ally and I set off again for Trimley St. Mary but this time we drove. I prayed constantly that morning, Ally and I were physically exhausted from working, packing and organising the van. We set out early for our 3 hr. 30 mins drive to Trimley. On the drive, my hayfever was acting up, which was odd as i only really suffer from hayfever in June and this was August. We pushed on, asking Jesus Christ to keep me strong and alert so that we could arrive safe and sound.

We arrived at The Mariners and started moving our boxes into our new flat above the pub. It was an amazing feeling, having our own place together. We met Melissa again and had a lovely chat about the area and how much we were going to enjoy being a part of the community. Ally and I then drove down to the sea front and had fish and chips. By this time,I was feeling really rough, so I prayed for clear roads as I drove back to Swindon.

The next day, Ally started feeling the same and that is when it hit us, we have COVID!!!! So all our belongings were in Trimley and we were going into 10 days of isolation, what a test. Being isolated together and very unwell was a tough trial. The starting date of our new job had to be pushed back, plus all the other arrangements.

Our first night was a Friday and we sat in the pub with Terry and Melissa being introduced to staff and guests. We were exhausted by the end of the evening so we went into our flat and started unpacking.

Work started at 10am the next day, so we unpacked enough to be comfortable, prayed and went to sleep, feeling so grateful for all that God had given us. The next day, Ally and I worked very hard and tried our very best. By that evening I was summoned to Terry and Melissa's table and I was told that we were not good enough and they were unhappy with what they saw in us. I asked what they wanted done better and i assured them we will do better tomorrow and that it was a case of being new to the building and staff. The next day Ally and I gave it everything we had and by the end of that day Terry and Melissa were happy with us.

Over the next few weeks leading up to Christmas and the New Year, the working conditions became very difficult. Christmas parties being booked and organised, then being cancelled due to Covid and staff having to isolate, also due to Covid. Ally and I were the only members of staff who didn't get it. Thank you, Jesus. Then the chef quit 3 days before Christmas Day with 60 people booked in for a 7 course dinner. I stepped in as Head Chef. I hadn't worked in a kitchen for over 15 years and it was hard going. However it did give me lots of time to listen to some of my favourite Gospel singers and, best of all, every Sunday while I was roasting potatoes and making giant Yorkshire Puddings, I got to listen to the Sunday Service from Christ Church.

After an exhausting Christmas period, it was nice to slow down and relax. Ally and I had only 2 full days off in and our next day off was New Year's Day.

Sadly, things didn't work out in our relationship with the owners and we gave in our resignation.

This has been a true test for Ally and I not having the free time to go to church, but In more ways it has strenthened us. We pray together more and when one of us is low, the other will pray for both of us. When we have been so exhausted, we have prayed just to get through the day - and we did!

My quote would be, "We can make our plans but the Lord determines our steps."

Letter to the clergy from the Bishop of Bristol, adapted for the magazine

Dear Friends,

As I am sure you know, the Church of England has a Diocese in Europe with 295 churches and chaplaincies and 159 clergy. I have been briefed on their perspectives on the current tragedy, on their response to the millions of refugees who are or will be flowing across Europe and on our government's planned responses. The situation both here and in mainland Europe is changing rapidly, but this brief outline is to inform your prayers and your ministry.

The Diocese in Europe is planning both for the immediate response (we heard from chaplains in Warsaw, Budapest and Brussels) and for the medium to longterm response.

The Diocese in Europe is working with USPG, which ensures a response that is informed by USPG's experience of mission in global conflicts and the impact of conflict on all the peoples of the world. While our media focus on Ukraine, war rages also in (for example) Eritrea, South Sudan and Yemen, and Afghanistan remains in turmoil. The Diocese in Europe has extensive experience of working with refugees from the global south, as well as from Syria, and is appealing for funds.

There is currently great generosity being shown by churches and the wider UK community, with clothes, food and pharmaceuticals being shipped from the UK by road to Eastern Europe. But it is hard to ensure that the right stuff is in the place where it is needed.

On the other hand, financial donations can be given directly to those in need so they can buy what is required locally.

One of the chaplains commented on how a gift of cash could be used to buy a coffee, pay for another night in a hotel while waiting for a visa, or buy what their baby needs; that cash restores a little self esteem for those who have lost everything.

The Diocese in Europe chaplaincies are, in addition to being part of the emergency response, also preparing for the longterm support of refugees from Ukraine.

We are at the beginning of a complex new social context. When the media have moved on, the churches will still be present.






Post Covid blues....?

As Immanuel's church secretary, I am currently beginning to think about my report to the church AGM in a few weeks time. This year, like no other, I am struggling to find the right message to bring to the meeting....after all it has indeed been a year like no other!

Our church membership roll stands at the smallest number in at least 6 decades, attendance at our morning service is down, on average, to 40/45 - half of what it was in pre-pandemic days, our church meeting has just taken the decision to discontinue Evening Worship on a regular basis, because of the poor attendance, and church organisations are struggling to get back on their feet. Our Sunday morning congregation will have seen the depleted numbers in the church choir that make part singing very difficult indeed (shortage of sopranos and absence of tenors); our Women's Fellowship does not feel ready to start up again yet; and a shortage of volunteers means that even offering a post-worship cup of coffee or tea is increasingly more difficult to arrange.

Of course there are many reasons for these issues: we are aware that not everyone feels ready to resume 'normal' habits - people still feel vulnerable and are out of the habit of Sunday church or meeting together. We completely understand that...but it means that life as we knew it has not yet got back to normal!

BUT - and there is a big but - lest this become a depressing view of life at Immanuel, I do have to say that our church buildings here on Upham Road are still very much the centre for so many community activities and groups. The premises resound throughout the week with all manner of music makers and singers, as choirs rehearse and ukelele groups practice; U3A groups meet and learn together, various committees meet to discuss and plan, children's groups meet and have fun and their laughter echoes around the site; and, for those who didn't know, our Romanian friends are worshipping and studying together several times a week here at Immanuel. A small group of Nepalese Christians gather on a Sunday afternoon to worship in their own traditions and language. So there is much to give thanks for and some wonderful opportunities for real outreach..



'April is the cruellest month,' wrote T.S. Eliot at the beginning of his magisterial poem, 'The Wasteland'. And it is a good description of what April may bring us between the war in Ukraine and soaring energy prices.

But apparently, major problems do not mean that we can't enjoy anything. According to the 'science of happiness,' fuelled by advances in brain-scanning technology and a cultural shift towards seeing happiness as a key index in human development, there is a way through the deep gloom that hangs over this month.

Neuroscientists suggest that even while we are dealing with the big problems of life, we can also make room for 'small, fleeting moments of fulfilment'. These can range from holding the hand of a loved one, to appreciating the daffodils in your garden, to enjoying a cup of tea with a good friend. As one writer has said: "Hold on to the small moments and the bigger picture of gloom doesn't have to be as overwhelming as it first seems."

1st April: Fooling Around

Probably the most famous April Fool's joke of all time was the 1960's BBC TV broadcast feature on the spaghetti farms of Italy.
