

Dear Friends,

Focus on the task in hand

By God's grace it has been an enormous privilege baptising 18 adults since last Easter. Each of them have remarkable stories to tell about how they have discovered Jesus's amazing grace, love and Good News, through their many life challenges. It has been very exciting seeing their growth in faith through their participation in the Fellowship of Faith which meets on the first and third Wednesday of every month 7-8.30pm in Christ Church. This was formed on the evening of our Partnership Confirmation 8th May 2022 when 2 couples, James and Alex, Simon and Ali, confirmed in our Partnership the previous year, offered to take things forward. All are welcome, so please come and join us.

We learn in Matthew's Gospel that when Jesus was baptised as an adult by John the Baptist, he heard a voice from heaven say, 'This is my son, whom I love, in him I am well pleased'.

Friends, may we, in our own challenges and experience hear afresh the voice of the living God, encouraging us to be secure in our Father's love for us and his presence each step of the way. Immediately after Jesus's baptism the spirit of God led Jesus into the wilderness where he was tested by the devil, who wanted him to take short cuts to success by attacking the most crucial foundation, Jesus's identity as the Son of God and his precious relationship with his Heavenly Father.

On 22nd February Ash Wednesday we will enter again, across our Partnership, the season of Lent lasting 40 days and 40 nights preparing for the momentous events of Holy Week and Easter. For Jesus, the Wilderness was where he met with God in an incredibly personal way. My prayer for myself and us is that this will be true across Swindon in all the challenges and temptations we are facing personally and together.

We also are very blessed that over the Palm Sunday weekend 31st March and 1st April SALOS, our very gifted Swindon Musical Theatre Company, will be presenting Godspell the Musical in Christ Church. Please do join us. This production is based on the Gospel according to St Matthew which is the Gospel the church is concentrating on this year in its Revised Common Lectionary across the world. This uplifting, joyful musical presents a contemporary view of Jesus as his followers and disciples re-enact many of the parables and scenes of his life.

Jesus's message of kindness, tolerance and love come vibrantly to life in this wonderful, not to be missed show which is rich in humour and pathos. I have been blessed to experience this joy through SALOS rehearsals in Christ Church. I have been encouraged and challenged by their wonderful singing, Prepare Ye the Way of the Lord, Day by Day, and Learn your Lessons Well. Sad News from Traidcraft

You may already have heard the news that the pioneering fair trade company Traidcraft has had to cease trading after over 40 years. This notice appears on the Traidcraft website from its directors:

It is with tremendous sadness that we announce that Traidcraft PLC has gone into administration.

'The business has been in a weak financial position for some years and the Covid-19 pandemic presented a significant new set of challenges. Just as we were emerging from the pandemic, like many other retailers, we faced the combined effects of the war in Ukraine, rising energy prices and increased transport costs.

'Sadly, despite the heroic efforts of our team at Gateshead, low consumer confidence during the critical autumn trading period led to a sales result significantly short of what was required to sustain the operation. December sales were also negatively impacted by the uncertainty created by Royal Mail strikes.

'After much deliberation and following advice from external advisers, we have come to the conclusion that the only honourable course of action is to appoint administrators. Our hope is that by doing this in a timely manner, we can minimise the impact on our suppliers and creditors.'

It is heartbreaking to bring the Traidcraft PLC story to an end in this manner but we can at least take some consolation from the knowledge that we have been a major force for good in the ethical retail sector for over forty years. We have championed the cause of trade justice to the point where we now have better standards and procedures in place to protect the rights and dignity of growers and producers all over the world.

'We would like to offer our heartfelt thanks to all those who have journeyed with us as employees, board members, shareholders and suppliers. We would particularly like to thank our loyal band of "Fairtraders", many of whom have been with us since the very beginning.

The mission to combat trade injustice and poverty is far from complete. It is important to recognise that Transform Trade (previously Traidcraft Exchange, the charity arm of Traidcraft) will continue its vital work supporting producers and fighting for trade justice and people centred trade.

Our hope and prayer is that others will also emerge to pick up the torch that we have carried for four decades.

Outcome of our financial Stewardship Campaign

You may remember we were projecting a loss of £4,500 for 2022/23, and losses like this every year thereafter. We asked individuals to consider their level of giving and for those who could to increase their financial contributions and to either sign up to pay by standing order and/or to Gift Aid their giving.

Thanks to a number of you, we saw an increase in giving of just under a total of £40 a week.

Sadly, we're not out of the financial woods yet. We're still projecting a loss of £4,100 by the end of 2022/23 (think how grim it would have been if we had not undertaken this financial exercise), primarily as a result of increased utility costs. Two caveats here:

The good news - until we're through March, we won't have an entirely clear picture what our end of year position will look like, so it is possible we won't post such a loss.

The bad news - It is unclear what effect coming off the Winter subsidised energy tariff will have on our financial position; it is almost certain our utility costs will rise, the question is by how much and by how much we use before the end of the Methodist Year on 31st August.

We also need to factor into our calculations that in 2023/24 the Circuit assessment (the money needed to fund our ministerial team, their admin, pensions and transport costs, the running of Methodist HQ and outreach programmes etc.) will increase by 6%. The North Wiltshire Circuit is working on what our proportion of that financial obligation is likely to be.

Godspell – Christine Senior reminisces on a Quest outing to see this show in 1971...

Reading that SALOS are going to be performing "Godspell" in Christ Church on 31st March and 1st April brought back memories of seeing the original West End Production at the Roundhouse when I was a teenager and a member of the ecumenical youth group "Quest". The performance had a profound effect on me at the time, especially the invitation at the end to go on stage to share in the bread and wine. I still have the original cast recording (1971) and remember David Essex as the lead and Jeremy Irons as John the Baptist walking through the audience to the stage singing "Prepare Ye the Way of the Lord". Marti Webb and Julie Covington were also in the cast. The production was at the Roundhouse November 1971 to January 1972 before moving to Wyndhams Theatre in February 1972.

We have been enormously blessed over the last 20 years at Christ Church by the Shinde family.




First crossing of Antartica

The first land crossing of Antarctica was completed 65 years ago, on 2nd March 1958, by the Commonwealth Trans-Antarctic Expedition, led by Vivian Fuchs. The team of 12 men travelled 2,158 miles from Shackleton Base to Scott Base (via the South Pole) in 99 days, using six vehicles.

The journey – nearly 22 miles a day, much of it in appalling conditions and obstructed by huge crevasses – started from the Weddell Sea and ended at McMurdo Sound. It was well prepared and strongly supported. The advance team at the Shackleton Base had to over-winter in weather much more severe than they had anticipated, but still they remained healthy.

Mount Everest conqueror Edmund Hillary, starting at the 'end', was responsible for laying supplies for the crossing party and forging a route for vehicles through the western mountains, but he and his group also made an unscheduled dash for the Pole, becoming in the process the third group to reach it, and the first to do so in vehicles.

The expedition had been timed to cash in on the worldwide interest created by the International Geophysical Year, a global project designed to stimulate scientific co-operation. Under the patronage of Queen Elizabeth II, the expedition was funded by the United Kingdom, New Zealand, Australia and South Africa. The continent was not crossed again until 1981. ■

Remembering Wiltshire born Sir Christopher Wren,



300 years ago, on 8th March 1723, English architect Sir Christopher Wren died at the age of 90. Best known for designing St Paul's Cathedral, he was also a ground-breaking anatomist, astronomer and physicist.

A founder of the Royal Society, Wren served as its president from 1680 to 1682 and was highly regarded by such eminent scientists as Isaac Newton and Blaise Pascal. But it is as an architect that he is best known: beside St Paul's, regarded as his masterpiece and

completed in 1710, he directed the rebuilding of 52 churches after the Great Fire of London in 1666 – though he did not work alone, heading a team of creative minds that included Nicholas Hawksmoor.

Born at East Knoyle in Wiltshire, Wren was the only surviving son of Christopher Wren the Elder, who became Dean of Windsor. He was a sickly child but lived a long life, despite his family being affected by the Civil Wars that broke out in 1642. He married twice but both his wives died very early – one of smallpox and the other of tuberculosis. Although Wren lived 90 years, he was married for only nine of them but had four children.

Two factors may have contributed to Wren's success as an architect: one was basic – his decision to move into that field because of the dearth of architects in the mid-17th century; the other was more dramatic – the Great Fire of London which necessitated so much rebuilding in the city and gave him the opportunity to shine.

Robert Hooke, the scientist and architect who was a friend of Wren, said: "Since the time of Archimedes there scarce ever met in one man in so great perfection such a mechanical hand and so philosophical a mind." ■
