

I do know how to ride a bike and I remember teaching my daughters to ride a bike...it takes it's time because there are so many factors involved and then suddenly it happens: one is cycling forward, learning how to turn and remembering that when you slow down you have to get ready to put one foot on the ground to keep it upright or else you fall.


I am writing this in the middle of the Easter weekend – we have had the Agape meal at Bath Road Methodist Church, where some even had their feet washed, then on Friday sharing the challenge of the three-hour (or one hour, whatever long) service, followed by the quiet, silent waiting of Saturday. Some of you may have been at the 5:30 am service on Sunday and the morning service at any of our Partnership Churches... Advent drifted into Easter... and then... and then?

Well, if we stop, we will lose our balance. But we can't just keep going for the sake of it; there must be a direction, a significance, a meaning to our journey. The meaning is that of the fullness of life for all people, which was the sense of the cross and the wait and the empty tomb. Not the triumph of the powers that are but the power that God made visible at Easter: the power of solidarity, of empathy, of love, of caring, or reaching out to others; the power of forgiveness and reconciliation. This is why we keep our balance and keep cycling.

We can't stop because we will fall off but we must keep the value of the meaning of all this newness we discover in the cross and the empty tomb as we connect with others and live our lives in the light of new life, new hope and new caring.

We are confronted by death on all fronts. True - though if we understand our faith journey as riding the bike of life, moving to keep our balance, we will discover the importance of celebrating God's presence, who has chosen never to leave us on our own; living with respect in creation, loving and serving others, seeking justice, and resisting evil. Our commitment is to life for all, so let us keep pedalling and join the journey, Jesus is part of all this, and we are not alone.

How your friends may be keeping you alive

Take care of your friendships and they will take care of you.

A recent study has found that if, in later life, you enjoy your friends on a regular and frequent basis, then the joy that they bring you may even halve your risk of death within five years.

The book of Proverbs (27:9) compares the balm of ointments and perfumes to the soothing effect of a good friend and an analysis of the research would seem to confirm this. People in their later years who socialised every day were healthier than those who didn't. Even those who saw their friends only once a week were healthier than those who didn't see any friends on a regular basis.

In fact, the team reported having found a 'dose response', with the greater the frequency of socialising, the greater the likelihood of living longer. As one doctor put it: "The more frequent the social activity, the more prolonged the survival time."

It is thought that having regular contact with friends encourages healthier thinking, better personal habits, increased physical activity and reduces stress.

Yet according to Age UK more than two million older people in England live alone and more than a million older people can go for a month without speaking to anyone.

The study was published in the Journal of Epidemiology & Community Health.

An update from Mark Buchanan at 'We Are Fair Trade'

We have been very busy getting everything in place ready for the official launch of 'We Are Fair Trade' and I am sending you this email to bring you up to date.

STAFF

I have been absolutely stunned at the loyalty and enthusiasm of the former Traidcraft PLC staff. Many of them are so committed to the cause that they are refusing to seek other jobs until there is absolutely no chance of returning to work with us at 'We are Fair Trade'. The knowledge, experience and commitment they will bring are a huge advantage to us.

OUR NAME

We chose to call ourselves 'We Are Fair Trade' to represent the fact that fighting trade poverty requires three things to work in harmony:

- 1. Fair trade legislation
- 2. Fair-minded people (like you) and
- 3. Fair Trade products that do not oppress the people who produce them.

WEBSITE

We have been busy building a brand new website for 'We Are Fair Trade' and it is looking stunning.

STOCK

We have £250,000 of Traidcraft stock being made available by a generous benefactor who took the stock as part payment against one of the loans he made to Traidcraft PLC and which we have agreed to sell on his behalf.

We have reached agreement with the administrators to purchase all remaining stock that is not being reclaimed by suppliers under their "retention of title" rights.

OTHER ASSETS

I have also reached agreement with the administrators to buy all the other remaining assets of Traidcraft PLC and they are willing to allow us to occupy the former Traidcraft building for a short time whilst we seek other permanent premises.

TRAIDCRAFT BRAND

We had a good meeting with the Traidcraft Foundation last week and explained our reasons for wanting the Traidcraft brand name to live on, namely that it is now a recognisable name, is synonymous with the good practice we will aspire to continue and we would also like to continue to manufacture products under the Traidcraft brand name.

In turn, the Foundation explained that this is a big decision for them and not one that they can make lightly or quickly. It may well be some time, therefore, until we know if we have been successful.

We are aware, though, that it is two months since we closed the doors at Traidcraft PLC and we want to get going as soon as we can so we have been pondering the idea of going ahead without the Traidcraft brand name.

Liz Gleed from Immanuel Church writes...

As we have discussed this option, we have been acutely aware of the tremendous loyalty you all have to Traidcraft and we don't want to jeopardise that. In fact we want to build on it and build the same loyalty with a whole new generation of advocates and fair traders.

To this end I was invited to answer a couple of questions (online) and, basically, I opted to retain the trade name Traidcraft if at all possible but not if it meant a detrimental delay in setting up the means of continuing to sell fair trade products.

I hope this makes sense. It is certainly looking promising.

Please keep everyone at 'We are Fair Trade' in your thoughts and prayers. ■

CHRISTIAN AID WEEK 2023 13TH - 20TH MAY

Christian Aid Week this year focuses on Malawi, one of the poorest countries in the world where

inflation has risen from 12% to 26%. It is a predominantly agricultural economy and is seriously impacted by climate change with droughts and cyclones. Malawi, along with neighbouring Mozambique, has recently been hit by Cyclone Freddy, the longest-lasting tropical cyclone on record (lasting 34 days). This cyclone is the equivalent of a full North Atlantic hurricane season.

The material for the week features Edith a widow who is part of a co-operative called Nandolo Farmers Association which deals with the growing, processing and selling of Pigeon Peas (known in the UK as yellow split peas or Toor dal). These are very well suited to the changing climate as they are drought resistant and also have deep roots which prevent them from being washed away after heavy rain. They are very versatile and nutritious and can be used to produce flour for baking as well as being eaten in other ways. They are also used for animal food.

We hope that you will be inspired to get involved in Christian Aid Week this year. This could be through "traditional" means such as house-to-house collection (in person or delivery only envelopes), e-envelopes, quizzes, coffee mornings or sponsored challenges. We also hope that you will be inspired to come up with innovative and fun ideas involving peas in some way. Start thinking! If you want to get involved or find out more do get in touch.

If a vicar asks you for money...

If you are contacted by a clergyman asking you for money, beware! It is a scammer.

Scammers have been impersonating various clergy, including even the Archbishop of York, to ask priests and other church people to buy them Amazon vouchers and online gift cards.

The scammers use either emails or texts and their message is along the lines: 'I have a request I need you to handle discreetly.' They then say: 'I am currently busy in a prayer meeting, so no calls – just reply to my email.' Then the message asks the intended victim to send them financial help, usually in the form of vouchers or gift cards.

The police reckon that the scammers have trawled church websites for the contact details of clergy and parish officials. At least one person is believed to have been fooled – and lost £1000 in a scam.

A diocesan spokesman said: "It seems this is a national trend." The police are looking into it and meanwhile advising people that: 'Clergy will never ask you to give them money, vouchers or personal banking details directly, even to help someone in need.... it is a scam.'



SHAP (Swindon Humanitarian Partnership)

When the Russian forces invaded Ukraine in February last year a number of us in Swindon watched the BBC news in horror and decided that

sitting on our backsides and doing nothing was not an option. Within a few weeks, the Swindon Humanitarian Aid Partnership (SHAP) was born and some 12 months on we have collected, sorted, boxed and delivered over 825 tonnes of aid into Eastern Ukraine where the impact of war is at its worst.

We are small but mighty. Our Board is made up of 3 Brits and 5 Ukrainians. We have wonderful help from local volunteers: British, Polish and of course Ukrainian. One of our great strengths is having former Directors of both Ukrainian and Polish Chambers of Commerce as Board members. We try wherever possible to deal directly with trusted charities and Foundations in Ukraine to minimise the risks associated with corruption.



In addition, we support the growing number of Ukrainian visitors to

Swindon with housing, school and university places, benefit applications and generally understanding of the systems and processes in the UK.

We identify issues of concern and campaign for sensible and credible changes, e.g. rent guarantees being offered by local authorities, allowing Ukrainians (using Ukrainian driving licences) to lawfully drive manual gearbox cars (yes, really, they are only legally allowed to drive automatics).

We try to ensure the media continue to focus on the continuing Ukrainian tragedy when there are so many other domestic issues demanding their attention.

We have been fortunate to have enjoyed extensive media coverage on television and radio and also in local newspaper and online platforms. >

Our 'Candles for Ukraine' campaign seems to have struck a chord over the Christmas period and is now getting national media coverage but it is far from a media gimmick. It is a response to a desperate need in Ukraine where many areas only have electricity supplies for a few hours a day. It is hard to believe that it has come to this in Europe in 2023.

In recent weeks we have been fortunate to receive invitations to important meetings with a Ukrainian task force led by Lord Tony Berkeley in the House of Lords and a very



special hour with General Sir Mike Jackson. General Mike has very kindly agreed to represent SHAP at high profile PR opportunities.

One such upcoming PR opportunity links to the House of Lords meeting. We have been promised dozens of single deck buses that we intend to convert into mobile field hospitals, shower blocks etc and drive to Ukraine for use by both civilian and army personnel.

The first such bus is currently being converted by volunteers in Swindon - all the seats have been removed and hospital beds and heart monitors will be installed in the coming days.

In a few weeks time the converted bus will be handed over to the Ukrainian Ambassador outside the Palace of Westminster with General Mike, Tobias Elwood, Chris Bryant and other Parliamentarians present. It should attract significant media attention.

We are also working closely with Network Rail in relation to various confidential Ukrainian aid initiatives. One I can disclose is the provision by Deutsche Bahn (free of charge) of a freight train from Swindon to Kviv carrying aid. We are fortunate to have such high powered partners.

The one issue that holds us back and constrains our work is a lack of funding. We are not allowed to even apply for money from the Disasters Emergency Committee (DEC) as we are not one of "The Big Six". Today our bank balance stands at a paltry £800.

Our enthusiasm, determination and commitment is our greatest strength and we will continue our work for as long as it is needed.



from the public so I found an alternative, European Metal Recycling in Gipsy Lane, Swindon.

Since then, 2020, I take cans each week to be recycled. We have many friends who collect the cans and we are now near to £4000 raised for Cancer Research since 2015.

Reflecting faith - The Lectern

Have you ever considered the furniture that we have in our churches?

Close your eyes and think what your own sitting room looks like and the furniture you have chosen to go in there. Most of us will have chairs, a sofa, one or more tables of different sizes, a fireplace and a television. Which way are the chairs facing? What's the focal point?

Churches are no different in that they have most fixtures and fittings in common and in set places.

In an Anglican church the focal item is the altar at the centre, with the lectern – from where the Bible is read out loud during services - on the right side as you look at it and a pulpit on the left-hand side.

In a Methodist church the pulpit is often behind but built higher than the altar and probably with a mobile lectern to be placed as chosen.

This demonstrates a key difference between the two denominations. The former holds the bread and wine in greater importance whilst the latter gives that status to the preaching and the Word of God.

Such variations reveal the way in which we 'reflect our faith' through our buildings.

The word 'lectern' derives from 'to collect, gather' and 'to speak', so together it means 'to gather words, to pick out words.'


The words in church which we read from the lectern have been carefully chosen and then written down. There have been centuries, indeed millennia of time, thought, prayer and energy going into preparing the Bibles that we read today!

It is a privilege to be asked to read from the Bible during a service as that will form the basis for the sermon, the hymns and indeed the whole theme for that day or even that week.

Have a look at the lectern in your place of worship or the place from which the Bible readings are given. What material is it made from? What shape is it? Does it have any distinctive features? Then consider how that passage or those passages are continued and expanded through the different elements of the service.
