

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# Partnership Letter

Greetings to you all, after a month off, September marks the beginning of activities all around, including lots of what goes on in the Church. And this is what I would like to reflect on – BEGINNINGS.

Having lived most of my life in the Southern Hemisphere, summer holidays were January/February, where was also the beginning of the year (at least the year measured in our Christian culture). Then had to adapt to a new way of considering beginnings: Yes, New Year still happens in January. And yet there are other "beginnings". The beginning of classes tends to be in September, or October at University. After the summer break, there is the beginning of most of our activities at Church, when groups meet again, or the choir comes back to enhance our worship after a month break. And the truth is that all breaks are necessary, we all have to stop for a time to then be able to get back to things. It is healthy to do this.

Of course there are other "New Years" that people in our wider communities celebrate: The Chinese New Year, the Jewish New Year, the Islamic New Year, the Gregorian New Year just to mention some. There are many more. Do we know when our neighbours who don't follow our celebration, celebrate their New Year? Wouldn't it be a good way of getting to know people who live close to us?

And yet, there are many beginnings we are faced with during our life. And the Bible picks up quite a few of them:

- Genesis 1 the beginning of all beginnings: In the beginning God created
- Revelation 21 the new heaven and new earth.
- Then we are confronted with the development of our faith, when we read in 2 Corinthians 5: In Christ we are a new creation.
- And the wonderful new opportunity we read about in Ezekiel 11: put a new spirit in them; I will remove from them their heart of stone and give them a heart of flesh. ➤

- The challenge for our every day life as we read in Colossians 3: put on the new self, which is being renewed in knowledge in the image of its Creator. Here there is no Gentile or Jew, circumcised or uncircumcised, barbarian, Scythian, slave or free, but Christ is all and is in all.
- And the words we hear each time we gather and celebrate Communion: Drink, this is the blood of the New Covenant (Matthew 26)
- And a final example taken from Romans 6: just as Christ was raised from the dead through the glory of the Father, we too may live a new life.

This is a reminder of the many new beginnings we are given by the love and grace of God. We experience a new beginning when we need, we are not limited to an "only" once experience. Isn't this wonderful?

And then there are those new beginnings when school finishes and its either a job or off to university. The new opportunities that come with a move, be it moving house, or moving country. The move away from an abusive relationship which brings hope, or the hopeful new beginning of people leaving their country in search of new opportunities, such as refugees because they have been experiencing horrors that they didn't create which have diminished life. The new beginning of retiring from a job, a marriage, or the birth of a child, or death.

So many times in life we face a new beginning and that can bring on fear, apprehension, excitement, sadness, hope.... A new beginning means also the leaving behind what was before. It's a journey that often leads to the unknown. New beginnings happen to us all, not just to some.

So we are invited to be empathetic to others experiencing new beginnings in the certainty that we too will go through something similar at one time or another. In faith we live each moment because through all this we can also affirm: "We are not alone, we live in God's world...we are called to be the Church, to celebrate God's presence...to love and serve others... In life, in death, in life beyond death, God is with us. We are not alone. Thanks be to God." (United Church of Canada)



# Remembering the genius of JRR Tolkien

Fifty years ago, on 2nd September 1973, JRR Tolkien, the fantasy writer, poet, scholar and educator, died. He was best known for his novels The Hobbit and The Lord of the Rings.

Born in Bloemfontein and descended from a family that originated in an area that was then East Prussian and is now Russian, Tolkien – always known as Ronald – thought of himself as unmistakeably English. He was brought up in the Birmingham area after the death of his father, who had stayed in South Africa while his wife and children visited England.

Ronald's mother then died when he was 12 and he was raised by aunts, uncles and a guardian who was a Roman Catholic priest, Father Francis. Tolkien later became a devoted Catholic and insisted that his fiancée, Edith Bratt, join him in that faith. She did so, reluctantly, and they had a long and extremely happy marriage. His beliefs were a significant factor in C S Lewis's conversion to Christianity.

Tolkien had a longstanding fascination with language and became an acknow-ledged expert in both linguistics and mythology, which led to his writing his two most famous works – and several others. Despite assumptions by some, none were intended as children's books, and The Lord of the Rings was never a trilogy – it was printed in three volumes for cost reasons.

The huge success of his writing led to unexpected fame. He and his wife eventually moved to Bournemouth and lived there until she died in 1971. He was then given rooms in Merton College, Oxford. He said in an interview shortly before his death: "A pen is to me as a beak is to a hen."

Since 2003, The Tolkien Society has organised Tolkien Reading Day which takes place on 25th March in schools around the world..■

# What can I say about my Sabbatical?

Well, the truth is that I can say a lot, but this is not the place or the time, so will share just a few thoughts.

May-June-July were the months in which I was able to do so many different things, things I have never done before, in places I had never been to before. It was wonderful and I am so grateful for this opportunity. My plan was to research Religious Art and the way it expressed the values of its time and challenged us today to ratify those values or find a different way forward. I had a plan of places to go to and art to see. And it all went wonderfully. I saw all I had planned to see and so much more, and was able to go to the places I wanted to go, plus an extra. And when the Sabbatical had finished there were two places left on the list, one of which I hope to have gone to before you read this, so that only leaves one place on the list.

It all began in Spain: Bilbao, Madrid and Valencia, from there off to Prague, then Munich, from there to Strasbourg and Colmar, a train journey to Ghent and then off to Berlin and a last minute arranged visit to Leipzig. Once back in the UK, it was St. Ives and then North Somerset and the Exmoor National Park area, even a short visit to St Aidan's Church in East Acton in London. I still have to get to Cookham and finally Coventry. It was not only paintings and sculpture, there were wonderful buildings which spoke loud and clear and asked complicated questions. I came across historical figures who changed history: Jan Huss in Prague, Martin Bucer, Gutenberg and Albert Schweitzer in Strasbourg, Bach, Mendelssohn and Schuman in Leipzig... And even mugged by two vicious seagulls in St. Ives who flew off with the best part of my Cornish pastie.

So far (and I still have a few more to do) I have 2200 photos, some of which have become 10 power-points, on different topics – from Adam and Eve to Crucifixions, Windows, Organs and Pulpits from different places to Street Art... And I guess a couple of other power-points will be added to this list. Far from including all the photos I took, but just a way of sharing with others what I saw. So if there is an interest in seeing them, just let me know (I promise I will not bore you too much!)

t was a time when I asked many questions and found some answers. A time to think of what the church has been, is, and what it could be doing different or also what it should continue to do. Questions about myself and what needs changing, and what I'd like to keep doing.

So much I never ever imagined I would see, do, think.. I kept on asking myself "Robert, are your really here? Are you really seeing this?" And it was true.

I thank God for this gift and the United Reformed Church for offering me the opportunity and Immanuel and Highworth URC for their support and kindness all the way through this time.

By the way – it is good to be back!

# IIMMANUEL HARVEST APPEAL for 2023 is VOICE4Girls. Launch date: 17th September.

Sheila Cannell the Chairman of the Trustees of the UK charity 'Scottish Love in Action' that works with VOICE4girls in India will be addressing the congregation at Immanuel on Sunday 17th September. Sheila has been involved with 'Scottish Love in Action' for many years and will be talking about VOICE4girls which she has visited on trips to India.

VOICE4Girls is an NGO that works with adolescent, marginalised girls and boys in India. The girls are at risk of dropping out or being removed by their parents for early marriage or labour. VOICE conducts activity-based camps in government and low-cost private schools. Through these camps, the girls acquire problem solving, decision making, negotiation, and communication skills.

Programmes for the girls includes a succession of modules when the girls learn about puberty, menstrual health, basic rights, and safety from violence; then topics such as education, future planning, gender and sexuality, consequences of early marriage and pregnancy, nutrition, mental health, and sexual and reproductive health. Finally they are trained on leadership skills and enabled so they can teach younger girls in their schools about topics such as safe and unsafe touch, importance of education, support system, and basic health and well-being.

After hearing many stories of bravery and resilience, VOICE realised that it was not enough to work with girls in isolation. VOICE has now developed a programme that works intensively with adolescent boys which aims to build gender ambassadors working to create a gender-equal world. The boys learn about mental health, puberty, menstruation, violence, and fundamental rights. They then delve further into topics such as rights and responsibilities, gender and sexuality, mental health and sexual and reproductive health.

Immanuel is hoping to raise £2,500 which will enable VOICE to deliver their programme to 300 girls and boys.  $\blacksquare$

Whoever believes that faith demands aquatic walks or any other such ridiculous demand has completely lost the centre of what gospel spirituality is about.

The wind, the waves, lose their power, calm comes and all is serene when the community is complete, including the Teacher, in the same boat.

Whenever we doubt remind us brother Peter, that wanting salvation in isolation will certainly end up with us sinking.

Life Member of the Friends, Christine Senior has clocked up a fantastic record transcribing 50 historic wills relating to Lydiard Tregoze. Here she tells us how she got involved in volunteering for the 100 Wills Project and why it's so compulsive.

Having lived in Swindon for most of my life, I remember coming to the park as a child and adult, bringing my children when they were young to play in the play areas and have picnics. In 2015 I found out about The Friends of Lydiard Park, (can't remember how, possibly via social media or the council website) and decided to join as a life member. I have been interested in local history for many years and enjoyed visiting the house when I could. Since then, I have enjoyed attending the literary talks, Christmas socials and summer outings.

When I read about the 100 Wills Project in 2021, it sounded interesting and as a touch typist something I could do easily at home. I contacted the project leader, Lynda Pidgeon and she emailed me my first will which was for the Rev'd. Timothy Dewell, 1692. Rev'd. Dewell was Rector of St. Mary's, Lydiard Tregoze for 42 years and a close friend of Sir Walter and Lady Johanna St. John of Lydiard Park. At that time the substantial Lydiard Rectory stood just East of the churchyard. You can read about Timothy Dewell in Report no 6 of the Friends of Lydiard Park.

The first few wills were quite difficult to transcribe due to the handwriting and spellings, especially surnames. However, I found it interesting to try and find information online regarding people and places mentioned. As with everything, the more you do, the easier it becomes and you get to recognise commonly used phrases and words of a particular period. The earliest one I have done is Adrian Frye 1603 who was a resident of Lydiard Millicent. Most of the wills I have transcribed recently were written in the 19th century. There were a lot of clergymen in the St John family some of whom appear to have been quite well off!

One interesting and rather long one, was the will of General Frederick St John, second son of Lady Diana Spencer and Frederick St John, 2nd Viscount Bolingbroke who died in 1844. Frederick had a distinguished military career and many adventures, surviving shipwreck and capture by pirates in 1800. You can see his portrait hanging in the State Bedroom at Lydiard House.

The will I have just started to transcribe will be my 50th one and is 13 pages long!' ■


