

Dear Friends,

Our continuing Christian calling and vocation

Long before we arrived in Swindon, people were praying here and long after we leave, Swindon people will still be praying away here. We are part of the sacred history of Swindon town. Each generation and, God willing, each human being has had an impact on our town leaving it a better place through their love, courage and service transforming people's lives for good. As the Bible says, "Jesus Christ is the same yesterday, today and forever".

It was sad to learn about the terrible vandalism at Holy Rood, the old Parish Church of Old Town Swindon on The Lawn in August. We are working at Christ Church with Swindon Borough Council and the wider Swindon community to make Holy Rood much more open and accessible again as a central part of the sacred history of Swindon, reminding us of all who have gone before us. Our dream would be to create a Garden of Reflection. Also we have a vision of the Holy Rood building being regularly opened as a place of Christian pilgrimage where visitors and Swindonians can stop, look, listen, pray and share food together as I did 25 years ago on Tuesday October the 6th 1998.

You are welcome to join with Nicola and me at 9:00 am on Friday 6th October for a 'Christ in Quiet' informal morning prayer service there. We will especially pray for all those who live and work and study in our Old Town Swindon parish and for all those engaged in creation care in Swindon and across the world in the environmental crisis facing us all in the human family.

As we celebrate Harvest festival on the 1st October at Christ Church please can I remind you that through our baptism we are, each one of us, whatever age we are, full time Christian workers. We are on earth serving Jesus with a clear purpose to pass on the Gospel, the good news of Jesus Christ who is alive, risen, ascended and very much present with us across Swindon through his Incarnation. As we do this we are blessed by God in so many ways as he calls us, in response to being blessed, to cultivate an attitude of gratitude by being a blessing in the way we live our lives. >

After the service there will be a party in the Community Centre, which will be 10 years old this November, where we can share stories of how God has blessed us over our time in Swindon, part of the Old Town Partnership of Churches. However long or short that might have been, God looks for faithfulness from us, following his example that we might journey onwards with him filled with faith, joy and resilience. As we do this, we will renew Christian hope as our churches have done over the generations each week.

More than anything, our faith communities on earth are here to worship God, love people and share the stories of hope which have been given to us in the Bible and in our Christian experience to pass on, with those who join us asking questions longing to find out more. Praise God for new stories of hope. This is what we celebrated on Sunday 27th of August when family and friends from around the world joined at Christ Church for the baptism of Caspar Marcel Stevenette, born on 10th May 2023. I had the wonderful privilege, as you can see from the picture on the front of this magazine, of baptising my first grandchild into the Christian faith in the same baptismal gown in which my dad baptised his grandson Thomas, Caspar 's Dad, in November 1991, each of our 5 sons and me, his son, in November 1962.

I am delighted that on 6th October 7.30 pm our worship in Christ Church will be led by the Old Town Partnership Choir and Toast our music group. Also, my great friend and Christian colleague, The Rev'd. Geoffrey Gleed has accepted my invitation to preach on God's continuing Christian mission in which he calls us to share.

We will also pray for the next generation, those who come after us including Caspar and his parents Tom and Rae as they fly out to Moscow the following weekend to take up a posting with the Foreign Office serving our country's interests developing networks in Russia. God bless you Tom, Rae and Caspar and God bless each one of us as Christian ambassadors living and sharing God's wonderful story of hope, faith and love here in Swindon and wherever else God leads us towards in Christian service.

Thank you for all your friendship, encouragement, prayers and support to me as your Vicar and the Stevenette family since we joined you in the Old Town Partnership after our move to Swindon in September 1998.

Every blessing in our continuing service as God's team mates. Thanks again.

Swindon Hardship Fund (SHF) Update for Old Town Churches September 2023

We are a small charity registered in 2020, created to support people in financial hardship in Swindon. We work by making small grants to individuals with a turnround of just a few days; referrals come from trusted partners. Recent new partners include Swindon Carers Centre (Swindon has a great many carers in need of financial support), Hazlewood Academy, and Wiltshire Womens Empowerment Programme, which specifically seeks to support people from ethnic minorities.

In the past year the scale of our work has more than doubled in response to the cost-of-living crisis. Most of our grants still go to 'gap-filling', things which the state does not help with such as furniture, mattresses, travel, floor coverings, but now we are also helping with basics such as food, rent and utilities. Many are single parent families, with domestic violence often a factor. "I truly can't express how much this has helped", response to a grant for mattresses. We have welcomed two new trustees. Trustees are all volunteers working from home, so we can direct as much support as possible to individuals experiencing severe financial hardship in our town.

We greatly appreciate the support that members of OTCP have given us. 

Immanuel's links with Highworth

Many readers will know that Robert's ministry, as well as looking after Immanuel, also includes the oversight of Highworth United Reformed Church. This church has a small congregation worshipping in a delightful listed chapel dating back to 1825. Thanks to the generosity of some members in Victorian times and some judicious investment management, it also benefits from a substantial annual income which is used to support a number of local charities.

Sadly, the Highworth fellowship can no longer provide elders who can manage the church's work and witness. Since elders are a legal requirement of any URC congregation, the Immanuel Elders have very readily agreed to add the Highworth church to their existing responsibilities. This means that the Highworth church can remain open, and that its very valuable work in the community can continue.

We are currently preparing to jump through some interesting legal hoops with a view to the emergence at the end of December of "Immanuel with Highworth URC" - one church in two locations - although for day to day practical purposes the two fellowships will continue very largely as now.

We would very much welcome the support and prayers of our Partnership friends as we embark on this exciting new chapter. And our Highworth friends would be delighted to welcome anyone from the Partnership to one of their services. Robert leads worship there on the fourth Sunday of each month, and there are services led by others on every second and fifth Sunday. And some would say that the best news is that all Highworth services begin at a very civilised 10.45 am!

Our Ukranian friends



On Easter Monday in 2022, Steve, Gemma and I welcomed a traumatised family from Ukraine into our home. We sent out a plea for help to support them as they had come over on the family scheme which meant we didn't qualify for any financial help from the Government. There were 17 of them and we needed to provide not only a roof over their heads but food, clothing, toys, everything. The response we received was amazing and we remain truly grateful to everyone who responded.

The family are incredibly musical and we decided to host a concert in our garden with drinks and homemade cakes to say thank you for all the help they and we received.

We were blessed with lovely weather so, on Saturday, 24th June, gazebos were erected, tables and chairs put out on the lawn, bunting was hung alongside the Ukrainian flag, and kettles were at the ready. The youngsters delighted everyone with their playing and singing and the father, Slavik, interspersed the music with the story of how they came to be in England. His story had to be interpreted by his sister-in-law, Luda, who lives in Wootton Bassett and who has been a huge support to them having got them to the UK in the first place.

They had originally lived in the Donetsk region which had suffered attacks from Russia when it was annexed in 2014. They moved to Kyiv. 8 years later, having built their own house, they had to move again because of bombs raining down

on them again from Russia. They went to Poland and then came across to England. With the help of their Church, Swindon Evangelical Church, we managed to get them moved into a large flat above a pub that Arkells had recently closed. They have lived there for just over a year and are now having to find another home as the property is up for sale. It is very difficult to find letting agents or landlords willing to rent homes to such a large family, even though the majority are now adults and wage earners. If you know of anyone willing to rent a large house to the family – 15 of them as the grandmother and sister would remain with the sister in Wootton Bassett – then please do let me know!

The man who created those lions in Trafalgar Square

It was 150 years ago, on 1st October 1873, that Sir Edwin Landseer, artist and sculptor, died. He is known mainly for his animal paintings and for the lion sculptures at the base of Nelson's Column in London.

He was a popular painter in his lifetime, appealing to people across class boundaries, and his death was marked by houses lowering blinds, flags flying at half-mast and crowds lining the streets for his funeral at St Paul's Cathedral.

An art prodigy, the young Edwin learned swiftly from his father, who was a talented engraver, and received tuition from several skilled artists. He first exhibited at the Royal Academy at the age of 13 (an 'Honorary Exhibitor'), was elected an Associate at the minimum age of 24 and became an Academician in 1831, aged 29.

Although Landseer was a Londoner, having been born there in 1802, he became very fond of the Scottish Highlands, which he first visited in 1824, and many of his best-known paintings, such as Monarch of the Glen, are set there. Queen Victoria commissioned many from him.

But his connection with the Highlands also stemmed from the time he enjoyed there with his lover Georgiana, Duchess of Bedford, the wife of his first major patron – John Russell, the 6th Duke of Bedford. She was twice Landseer's age when he met her at the age of 21, having been commissioned to paint her portrait, but they fell in love and the Duke, who was considerably older, permitted the relationship, which continued after his death.

But because their only child, Lady Rachel Russell, did not bear his name, Landseer was unable to cope mentally and he suffered a severe nervous breakdown, leading to prolonged depression and hypochondria. In 1872 he was declared insane at the request of his family. He had been knighted in 1850.



Living with Dementia

I have just returned from visiting my sister, Val who is in a care home because she has dementia. It was a two hour journey to get there and a two hour journey home and in that time I wondered if it was worth all the effort as the time I spent with her was so short, not that my time was restricted in any way on the part of the care home, on the contrary, I could have stayed as long as I liked but it was not an easy visit. There was a time three or four years ago when I would go down to see her and I would take her out and we would have tea together or an ice cream from a delicious ice cream restaurant right on the sea front. Now she does not know me and neither does she know her own daughters.

It was her birthday recently, she was 99 and the care home staff had made it a special day and judging by the photographs I saw of the celebrations my sister seemed to enjoy the day, so I went with high hopes that she might be pleased to see me. I was wrong. However, I noticed that she had a better relationship with the carers than with me and I suppose this is good in the circumstances.

This led me to think that her world has changed and family is not her world now, her world is within the care home, the carers are the people she relates to now and not us, not even her daughter who visits very frequently.

These thoughts led me to think of a comparison of the relationship that we and others might have with God. Some might have a relationship with God but as other things crowd in on their lives, that relationship becomes weaker and weaker until, maybe, it no longer exists. Does this sadden God I wonder? I think it must. Is this what Paul might have been referring to when he wrote to the Ephesians and said to them "Do not grieve the Holy Spirit" (Ephesians 4: v.30)? The one comforting aspect is that, just as we go on loving our family members, come what may the same applies to God, for again I quote Paul who said that nothing can separate us from the love of God.

My sister does not remember me now, she cannot remember the life we shared, the holidays we enjoyed together travelling to many parts of the world but I comfort myself with the fact that one day she will know, she will know all her family and she will know how much we love her.

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Is now a good time to grow old?

"Don't grow old," a parishioner of advanced years warned me some while back. "You won't like it." Sadly, that dear woman is no longer with us, and I'm a whole lot older than when she offered me that kind advice. But was there wisdom in her words?

It's true that generally people are living longer and in better health than in generations before, but there are increasing challenges for older men and women in our society.

My friend, Maggie Dodd is an 'Anna Chaplain' for older people. She is one of around 300 such chaplains up and down the country. They spiritually support people – of strong, little or no faith – in care homes, sheltered housing or in their own homes. Maggie has told me how life is becoming harder for older people, and we've swapped notes on what we have both observed. She told me: "Some of the basic services older people need are becoming more difficult to access. I hear about doctor's surgeries asking for patients to print out their own forms or send photos to or from smartphones. Banks are phasing out high street branches, pushing everyone towards online banking. Many older people feel very uneasy about going online, worried of being scammed out of their savings.

"A trip to the shops is also becoming more complicated. Checkouts in supermarkets are increasingly self-service. Mobility can also be affected as car parks often need an app to be uploaded onto a smartphone to park. In many car parks there is no option to pay by card or cash!" Plans to remove the ticket offices at train stations will make matters worse for many older would-be rail travellers.

Maggie told me "This gradual marginalisation of people can leave them feeling lonely and isolated. Loneliness can have a huge detrimental effect on health and wellbeing. Prolonged social isolation and loneliness are the equivalent of smoking 15 cigarettes a day."

It's good that many churches run special events and activities for older people, as well as groups for all ages. But is this enough? Christians are called to follow Christ's example and speak out for at risk of being marginalised in our society. Today, that could be our older brothers and sisters.

The man who created those lions in Trafalgar Square



It was 150 years ago, on 1st October 1873, that Sir Edwin Landseer, artist and sculptor, died. He is known mainly for his animal paintings and for the lion sculptures at the base of Nelson's Column in London.

He was a popular painter in his lifetime, appealing to people across class boundaries, and his death was

marked by houses lowering blinds, flags flying at half-mast and crowds lining the streets for his funeral at St Paul's Cathedral.

An art prodigy, the young Edwin learned swiftly from his father, who was a talented engraver, and received tuition from several skilled artists. He first exhibited at the Royal Academy at the age of 13 (an 'Honorary Exhibitor'), was elected an Associate at the minimum age of 24 and became an Academician in 1831, aged 29.

Although Landseer was a Londoner, having been born there in 1802, he became very fond of the Scottish Highlands, which he first visited in 1824, and many of his best-known paintings, such as Monarch of the Glen, are set there. Queen Victoria commissioned many from him.

But his connection with the Highlands also stemmed from the time he enjoyed there with his lover Georgiana, Duchess of Bedford, the wife of his first major patron – John Russell, the 6th Duke of Bedford. She was twice Landseer's age when he met her at the age of 21, having been commissioned to paint her portrait, but they fell in love and the Duke, who was considerably older, permitted the relationship, which continued after his death.

But because their only child, Lady Rachel Russell, did not bear his name, Landseer was unable to cope mentally and he suffered a severe nervous breakdown, leading to prolonged depression and hypochondria. In 1872 he was declared insane at the request of his family. He had been knighted in 1850.



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




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Remembering the Beatles

Sixty years ago, on 15th October 1963, the term 'Beatlemania' first appeared in the Daily Mirror newspaper in the UK. It described the intense, frenzied reaction of fans of the Beatles and their music.

The group - John Lennon, Paul McCartney, George Harrison, and Ringo Starr - had been attracting wild adulation in the north of England, notably at the Cavern Club in Liverpool, since the start of the 1960s. But from 1964 Beatlemania spread throughout the country, and then the world – particularly the USA, where the Beatles were transported to concerts by armoured car for their own protection.

Commentators were eager to diagnose the cause of the phenomenon sometimes not convincingly – but it was agreed that the high-pitched screaming by girl fans had similarities with religious fervour and hysterical worship of young men they saw as gods.

As is well known, in 1966 John Lennon remarked that the group had become more popular than Jesus, but this was a step too far for many, leading to a backlash and violence at subsequent concerts worldwide. This and the inability of the group to hear themselves play above the screams led to the Beatles stopping touring altogether. Their 1965 album Rubber Soul already projected a different, more progressive, thoughtful feel.

But a cultural trend had been set, and subsequent boy bands, from the Monkees to One Direction, tended to get the kind of 'worship' from their fans that was undeniably linked to a freedom from authority and convention.

It was not totally new, however. Back in the 1840s, fans of Hungarian pianist and composer Franz Liszt apparently displayed a similar level of fanaticism, which poet Heinrich Heine called 'Lisztomania'.

Don't mention it!

As part of his annual talk to our local Town Council, our minister told some funny stories. A Bear called Paddington

It was 65 years ago, on 14th October 1958, that Michael Bond's children's book, A Bear Called Paddington, was published. It marked the debut of the lovable Paddington Bear, who is now a household name after appearing in two irresistible films.

Paddington starred in more than 20 books written by Bond, who died aged 91 in 2017. The original story was inspired by the author witnessing Jewish and British evacuee children passing through Reading station. Bond wanted the bear to have come from "darkest Africa", but this was changed to Peru when his agent pointed out that there were no bears in Africa.

Many people have found Christian characteristics in the bespectacled, kind, red-hatted, innocent Paddington, who always tries to do the right thing but often gets into trouble as a result. He is invariably polite, but has a "hard stare" for those who behave badly. The two hugely successful films, with Ben Whishaw voicing Paddington and household names in other roles, established the bear in the national psyche – a natural successor to Winnie the Pooh.

A stuffed toy Paddington Bear was chosen by British tunnellers as the first item to be passed to their French counterparts when the two sides of the Channel Tunnel came together in 1994. The books have been translated into 30 languages and have sold more than 30 million copies.

Paddington has also reached the very top of society. Comedian and later President of Ukraine Volodymyr Zelensky dubbed him in the Ukrainian version of the films, and to cap everything, Paddington joined the late Queen in one of her last public appearances – a brilliant comedy segment in the Platinum Party at the Palace on 4th June 2022, in which the Queen 'revealed' that she always carried a marmalade sandwich – Paddington's favourite food – in her handbag.
